

On your initial visit, you will watch a short video called "[The Father's Love Letter](#)" and a [teaching on healing by Rev. Cal Pierce](#) that will build your faith.

A team member will call your name as a Healing Room becomes available. When you enter the Healing Room, the members will introduce themselves. Once you begin to receive prayer, a team member may need to clarify on what they are "hearing" from the Holy Spirit, so they may ask you additional questions. Anything you share is in strict confidence, so please be candid: The area being explored may be the key to your healing. There is also an intercessory prayer team in another room praying for you the whole time you are in the Healing Room. If they "hear" something from the Holy Spirit, there may be a knock on the door so the intercessors can share it with the team that is ministering to you.

The Apostle Paul instructed us to pray in our native language and to pray in the Spirit. Some team members may quietly pray "in the Spirit" (which may sound like a foreign language to you). This is Biblical and is a very effective method of praying.

"What is *the conclusion* then? I will **pray with** the spirit, and I will also **pray with** the understanding. I will sing **with** the spirit, and I will also sing **with** the understanding." (1 Cor 14:15)

"Likewise **the Spirit** also helps **in** our weaknesses. For we do not know what we should **pray** for as we ought, but **the Spirit** Himself makes intercession for us with groanings which cannot be uttered." (Rom 8:26)

The Healing Team may anoint your hands with oil. This, too, is Biblical. If you are sensitive to perfume-type odors, please let them know. The Healing Team will lay hands on your shoulder or head or hold your hand. Jesus tells His disciples to lay hands on the sick and they SHALL recover. (Mark 16:18)

"Prepare the way, take the stumbling block out of the way of My people." (Isa 57:14b)

There can be stumbling blocks on the road to healing. You may have been praying for years, but your prayers seem to go unanswered. 1John 5:15 promises us that if we know that He hears us, then whatever we ask of Him, we know that we will have it. God is not a liar: His Word is true (Romans 3:4). So why do our prayers sometimes seem to go unanswered?

Hosea 4:6 tells us that God's people are destroyed for lack of knowledge:

For example, Isaiah 59:2 tells us that our iniquities can separate us from God and that our sins can cause Him to hide His face from us, so that He will not hear.

The enemy can sometimes attack us with sickness and disease, stealing our health, because we have sin or generational iniquity (sin passed down from our ancestors – see Exodus 20:5) in our lives. These stumbling blocks can hinder our prayers from being heard and receiving His promise in 1John 5:15. Here are a few of the stumbling blocks that can hinder healing:

Unconfessed Sin	Unforgiveness
Bitterness	Self Hatred
Fear	Occult/New Age
Anger	Resentment
Guilt	Rejection
Pride	Unbelief

Take time in the waiting area to speak to and listen to God. Be honest with Him -- He knows that we're not perfect (Romans 3:23). God demonstrated His own love toward us in that, while we were still sinners, Christ died for us (Rom 5:8). He loves us so much that He shed His blood so our sins could be forgiven. 1John 1:9 promises that if we confess our sins, He is faithful and just to forgive our sins and to cleanse us from all unrighteousness. "Confess your trespasses to one another, and pray for one another, that you may be healed. The effective, fervent prayer of a righteous man avails much." (James 5:16) Earnestly seek God. Ask Him to reveal any sin or generational iniquity in your family so you can repent of it. Have an expectation that Jesus will heal you.

And, if you haven't already done so, ask Jesus to come into your heart to be your Lord and Savior. Romans 10:9-10 tell us "that if you confess with your mouth the Lord Jesus and believe in your heart that God has raised Him from the dead, you will be saved. For with the heart one believes to righteousness, and with the mouth confession is made to salvation." See Rev 3:20, John 1:12, John 3:3, John 3:16-17.

Ecc 3:3 tells us that there is a time for healing. 2 Corinthians 5:7 tells us we walk by faith and not by sight. We should never look at our circumstances, but rather upon Jesus, trusting that in His perfect timing you WILL be healed. Even Jesus had to pray for one blind man twice until he received his sight. We encourage you to keep returning for prayer until you are completely healed.

It is through faith and patience (perseverance) we inherit the promises. (Heb 6:12) We will contend with you for your healing. Do not give up!
